## The Placid Sparrow

It is unusual to find an upside down bird in the middle of a somewhat empty painting. Quinton produced a canvas tall and narrow in order to leave space for the sparrow to fall. It is only to when we see a white outline of a hand above the sparrow – God – and then we understand the topic.

The image derives from a biblical passage: Matthew 10:29-31

"Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground outside your Father's care. And even the very hairs of your head are all numbered. So don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows."

In several paintings Quinton points to another dimension that is beyond the canvas, that which is unseen. Here it is the hand of God.

Shakespeare then alludes to this story in Hamlet, Act V, Scene 2 "There's a special providence in the fall of a sparrow. If it be now, 'tis not to come; if it be not to come, it will be now; if it be not now, yet it will come: the readiness is all."

Following along the same sparrow story we can trace this image to American history: "And if a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without His notice," Benjamin Franklin asked at the Constitutional Convention in 1787, "is it probable that an empire can rise without His aid?" Franklin invoked the sparrow in service of his argument that the convention should open each day with a prayer"
